The use of the word "totem" to describe the carvings historically found along the Northwest Coast is somewhat misleading. Even the earliest explorers recognized that the poles did not depict gods nor were they objects of worship. Rather the totem poles of the Northwest Coast are heraldic.

Totem Pole History. Coast Salish artists did not carve tall wooden heraldic poles, known as totem poles, until the early 20 th century. In earlier times, interior house posts were sometimes carved with human figures and other "spirit helpers" or abstract images referring to the spirit power belonging to the owners of the house.

Totem Pole Myths. Myth: Totem poles are a recent introduction to the Northwest Coast. Fact: Native Northwest Coast oral histories tell us that tall carved poles have been made on the Northwest Coast since ancient times. The earliest European explorer's drawing of a Northwest Coast house frontal pole was made at Dadens village on Haida Gwaii (the Queen Charlotte Islands) in 1791.

In contrast, the Kwakwaka'wakw poles featured deeply etched surfaces and jutting wings and beaks. 12 The famous Stanley Park totem poles, although located on Coast Salish territory, include totem poles from all over coastal British Columbia, including Haida, Salish, Kwakwaka'wakw, Nisga'a, and Nuu-chah-nulth designs.
